

Felony and Treason

Title 18 of the United States Code *Crimes and Criminal Procedure* provides, in pertinent part:

18 U.S. Code § 4 - Misprision ^[1] of felony

Whoever, having knowledge of the actual commission of a felony cognizable by a court of the United States, conceals and does not as soon as possible make known the same to some judge or other person in civil or military authority under the United States, shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than three years, or both.

All officers of the Uniformed services of the United States have a duty to support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic, as set forth in the United States Uniformed Services Oath of Office, which each officer takes upon commissioning:

“I, AB, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter. So help me God.”² [Underline added.]

Shortly after the filing of the petition, Petitioner provided both a paper and electronic copy thereof and made known to the following military authorities (1) the felony of fraud (gross negligence), by reason of dereliction of the jurisdictional provisions of the Constitution, and (2) treason to the Constitution, by reason of usurpation of exercise of jurisdiction in extra-constitutional geographic area, on the part of all United States District Judges of all United States District Courts located within the exterior limits of the respective geographic area occupied by the 50 freely associated compact states of the Union:
